#### III. Fire Safety Tips and Announcements

Fire Safety Tip: Fire safety is important for everyone, including our children. Explore [fire.honolulu.gov](http://fire.honolulu.gov) to access more family-friendly fire and life safety resources.

The 2022 Fire Fighter's Safety Guide will be distributed to an estimated 140,000

elementary school students and their families statewide in time for Fire Prevention Week (October 9-15, 2022). In a joint effort with the State of Hawaii's Department of Education and numerous community-based partners, county fire departments continue this fire safety program to increase fire safety awareness among students, parents, and teachers. The National Fire Protection Association celebrates 100 years of Fire Prevention Week, and this year's theme is "Fire won't wait. Plan your escape." Join the celebration with HFD at the Honolulu Zoo on Saturday, October 15, 2022.

- It is natural for children to be curious and ask questions about fire, play with fire trucks, or pretend to cook. Use these opportunities to teach them about fire safety.
- Speak with children about what their friends or other children are doing with fire. What are they seeing online in video games, on television, in movies, and on social media? Teach them specific ways to resist peer pressure to misuse fire.
- Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach, preferably up high or in a locked cabinet. Children should always tell an adult when matches or lighters are found. Closely supervise children, and ensure they are kept away from other fire sources, including lit candles, cigarettes, grills, and stoves.
